

## **Curtis E. Huntington**

Curtis Huntington is a fellow of the Society of Actuaries (FSA 1968), a member of the American Academy of Actuaries (MAAA 1972), a fellow of the Conference of Consulting Actuaries (FCA 2001), and an associated professional member of the American Society of Pension Professionals and Actuaries (APM 1990).

After completing service as a commissioned officer in the U.S. Public Health Service, Mr. Huntington re-joined the New England Mutual Life Insurance Co. (Boston), where he served from 1967 until his early retirement in 1993. At his retirement, he was Vice President and Corporate Actuary. Prior to that, he had served as the chief auditor and had various positions in individual actuarial operations.

Since 1993, Mr. Huntington has been a Professor of Mathematics at the University of Michigan, where he also directs the Actuarial Mathematics Program and the Financial Mathematics Program and serves as executive director of the Michigan Pension Education Training Program. He was the associate chair for education from 2004 to 2007.

Mr. Huntington chairs the Audit and Finance Committee of the International Actuarial Association (IAA) and serves on the IAA's Accreditation, Education, Executive and Professionalism Committees. In addition, he serves as secretary/treasurer of the Muhanna Foundation, with headquarters in Beirut, Lebanon.

Mr. Huntington is a former member of the Society of Actuaries (SOA) Board of Governors, a former SOA vice president for research, a former chairperson of the SOA Education and Research Section, and a former chairperson of the Futurism Section. He served on the SOA's Education and Examination Committee from 1971 to 1986, and chaired that committee from 1984 to 1986.

He has also served as a director and vice president of the American Society of Pension Professionals and Actuaries (ASPPA), as a chairperson of the ASPPA Foundation, as an

executive member of ASPPA's Education and Examination Committee and, most recently, as chairperson of ASPPA's Professional Conduct Committee.

Mr. Huntington was a member of the Actuarial Education and Research Fund (AERF) from 1985 until 2003, when it merged with The Actuarial Foundation. He was the fund's executive director from 1994 to 2003, and he is currently a trustee of the foundation and chair of its AERF Committee (Education and Research). In addition, he is a director of the Actuarial Foundation of Canada.

Mr. Huntington holds a B.A. in mathematics (with distinction) and a master's degree in actuarial science (also with distinction), both from the University of Michigan. He also earned a Juris Doctorate (cum laude) from Suffolk University.
